#### **CHAPTER F MEMBERSHIP**

There are probably quite a few of you who don't know what New Mexico chapter you are assigned to. While it is true that you are a member of all chapters GWRRA does assign you to a specific chapter for accountability purposes. assignment is based on zip codes. This assignment may or may not affect you based on chapter activities, examples are recognition of birthdays, anniversaries, membership matters and so forth. GWRRA periodically provides each chapter membership coordinator printouts of assigned members; these printouts contain a wealth of membership information about you. If you are assigned to Chapter F and "think" you belong to Chapter W then just remember you, and all your membership data, is invisible to Chapter W, they do not know you exist (we do not receive other chapter printouts). However, GWRRA chapter assignment has no bearing on what chapter rocker you wear on your vest; wear whatever you like and participate in whatever chapter activities you like.

GWRRA-assigned Chapter F members are listed below. Some of you will no doubt be surprised at being assigned to Chapter F. There are obviously some errors in the GWRRA assignments as we have members in the East Mountains assigned to Chapter F who should really be in Chapter W. For the most part folks east of the Rio Grande are in W and west in F. To further complicate matters, it is possible to live in, say Tijeras, and be a member of Chapter F. This is done through a "chapter override" and is an action <u>you</u> must request through GWRRA. Those with overrides are so noted on the GWRRA printouts and Chapter F has several.

Because of the email communications function I (JoeO) perform, Dave Brown, the Chapter W Membership Coordinator, and I work closely together. Dave keeps me informed of new W members and W meeting visitors that need to be added to my contacts list.

#### **CHAPTER HISTORIAN**

#### **IN THE BEGINNING**

Hello fellow Chapter F riders: I am Gene Wagner and am the new Chapter F historian. I will be writing an article on the history of GWRRA, the Wing Dings, etc. The picture below is the first patch that GWRRA gave with the membership in 1977 and part of 1978. This picture on the patch was taken at the edge of the Grand Canyon. In 1978 they went to the helmet patch. At the bottom of the helmet, where GWRRA is now, was GL1000. The patch remained that way until 1979 when the GL1100 came out. In 1978 GWRRA came out with the helmet patch, they came out also with the helmet pin and bars for each year for each year and the star bars for recruiting members.





#### RIDER EDUCATION

#### THE LEARNING CORNER by JACK SIDLER

One who wears no helmet obviously has nothing worth protecting.

One of the problems with society today is that we are raising a generation that does not know what it means to take personal responsibility for their actions. They have a feeling of entitlement that it is someone else that is responsible for their safety and well-being. As motorcycle riders nothing could be further from the truth. The person that is ultimately responsible for their safety is the operator of the motorcycle (or car). The only thing that anyone else on or off the road owes you is not hitting you or placing you in a situation that is out of your control. Unfortunately, we all know that doesn't always happen. It is your responsibility to ensure that your motorcycle is in proper operating condition, that your safety gear is in good shape and is being used properly, that you are operating your vehicle in a safe and proper manner, and that you are not riding at a level above your skill and/or comfort zone.

Your Chapter Educator or Club Safety Officer is available to provide assistance and knowledge to help you but he is not ultimately responsible for whatever actions you choose to take (or not to take). He may point out a problem with your bike but it is your responsibility to either fix it or have a reputable mechanic fix it. A friend with more experience may be willing to assist you but it is your responsibility to act on whatever good advice you may receive. Of course, one problem is, there are a lot of "know it alls" out there who don't really dispense with good or proper advice, and it is your responsibility to know whether the person giving you advice is really correct. After all, it normally doesn't affect them if it is wrong; they are not likely to be the one in the box. Seek people or groups that have a proven and demonstrated track record of providing the best possible advice with the realization that no one and no situation will ever be the same. Don't rely on safety or maintenance advice from the guy next door whose only riding experience is every Saturday afternoon from the garage to the bar across town.

Buy your safety gear; wear your safety gear, at all times. You never know when you will actually need it but someday you will. If the group you are riding in is going too fast (or too slow) for you, either talk to the group at a stop or on the CB or find another group to ride with. You can always try to drum up your own group with others who have a similar riding style as you.

It is your pride and your ego that will get you into trouble by making you feel like you have something to prove by not wearing that helmet or that you will be embarrassed if you can't ride like the others, or don't want to ride like the others. Just because the tailgunner says they have

My favorite motorcycle magazines:

### 1. Roadrunner Motorcycle Touring and Travel

This is my favorite magazine. It is an all-manufacturer bike/scooter magazine that focuses mainly on tour riding and traveling by motorcycle. It is mainly focused on US riding but it does have many interesting articles on riding around the world as well. They also do a few organized tours a year, mostly in Austria and Italy as this is where the magazine founder was from. They do some reviews of bikes and riding gear but not to as great an extent as other magazines.

#### 2. Roadbike Magazine

This is my second favorite magazine. Its founders decided that there are enough rags out there dedicated to Harleys and their concomitant lifestyles and they decided to only focus on metric bikes. Mostly Japanese and European brands but they do include Victory in their repertoire. They usually have more thorough bike reviews but they do also include some touring articles as well.

#### 3. Rider Magazine





The best path is to seek the advice of a feeS based advisor who is on your side of the table. The worst path is a commissionS based advisor who is usually on the opposite side of the table. If one cannot afford an advisor, then learn some investment selection and market timing tools. If one cannot afford an advisor, there are reputable advisory services I will suggest to help out.

For \$50 per head or per couple, this 1 1/2 hour seminar will try to help investors get on the right side of the market cycle. Phil will not push the services of the program he manages. As he did at last year's seminar, Phil will again offer individual consulting advice for half his normal hourly rate. The following was submitted to JoeO by Tony Nelson, a Chapter F member and a long ago friend of Jimmy Stricklin. Tony has given his OK to reprint it to show what a great friend Jimmy was and what "family" is all about.

"Joe, somehow, this seems like a good day to reflect on my long time friend, Jimmy L. Stricklin. I understand that there are many today that do not or did not have the opportunity to meet our Jimmy. This is one of many great experiences which I shared with my beloved friend.

I purchased my 1500 Wing about May of 1996. My first memorial ride with Jimmy began on the first weekend, a few days after I brought my Navajo Red home. But that's another story that can wait. Instead, let me get back to the start of the Jimmy Stricklin Memorial New Years' Day Ride.

New Years' Day, 1997

The call came, as all rides being, early in the Day. Jimmy wanted, no; scratch that, **NEEDED** to ride. I wasn't prepared for a ride, of any sort that day, so I expressed my regrets and declined. Well, instead, Jimmy called upon, long-time friends, Art Carnes and I believe, Jim McMahon to ride with. Later, Jimmy related to me, that it was a good ride and that I should've accompanied them. Well, there was next year.

New Years' Day 1998

We had discussed this ride in advance, complete with gas stops, food, etc. It was to be a good day for an all day ride. This time, we had a good following; about 4 or 5 of us. I can't recall who the participants were, but it was a good ride. Julian Smith, Jimmy, and myself, kept our spirits up with a lot of jokes and teasing one another of past rides, no, by this time, we had come to accept our outings as 'adventures'. Mind you, plans were already being planned for the following New Years' Day. We would plan this upcoming ride with a total Chapter invite with 'F 'n' W' and plan to end-up at a hot meal serving place. We were laughing and joking about what to name this auspicious ride. So we came up with The Jimmy Stricklin New Years' Day Ride. We liked it, it sang well and Jimmy just couldn't stop laughing about it.

This particular year was filled with many rides. Jimmy, Julian, and I shared many adventures, explored much of this state and visited many times the good eating establishments these areas offered. Jimmy was a big man. He loved to share meals and especially enjoyed the many rides. Of course, no Jimmy adventure would be complete with the various 'Jimmy Stories'. He would come up with some good ones on the rides, over the radio, over meals and did I mention, over rides? His stories were very good. Some folks would question many of them; however, all were very entertaining. New Years' Day 1999

We went all out for this ride. Good group, good route and good food. Of course, I am leaving out a lot of other details, mainly because my memories of these rides are very special to me. Jimmy Stricklin is held in fond, loving memory by my immediate family. My parents and all of the Nelson clan met 'Grandpa Jimmy'. He and his wife, Pierette, were very special for us. We miss them dearly.

This Ride had its start about 1997, New Years' Day. After his passing, which we always joked about, we added the "Memorial" word to the title, The Jimmy Stricklin Memorial New Years' Day Ride.

I'm sure those who knew Jimmy, would agree with me, when I say, he would light-up the room with his presence. His personality was one that one would not easily forget. I don't think there is anyone alive who had any dislike for this man. He had an opinion on everything, did he not Julian? Also, more often than not, a good story would always be in accompaniment.

I'm sure we all have our versions of the Jimmy experience; this was just a small portion of mine.

Julian has a good collection of past photos. Julian, please share these with the good folks.

Oh, I must make mention, that Jimmy's **NEED TO RIDE**, came about because of the Holidays. For the Stricklin Family, the Holidays began a few days prior to Thanksgiving each year. By New Years', he needed to get away, for awhile, from all the kids, grandkids, etc. The Germans have a saying, that after 3 days, fish and family begin to smell'. This, no doubt, was probably over heard by some Germans from the lips of Jimmy Stricklin. So began the RIDE.

Another note, Jimmy was retired. Therefore, he had personal cards printed with the usual name, address, etc. One card had small lettering at the bottom that read: "Available for all parties, fishing, hunting trips, sleepovers, etc. By the way, I live with Pierette". Another card's inscription, my favorite, would have the large print on the back, "I sit by the phone with my helmet, gloves, and boots on, ready for someone to call for a ride". This was our Jimmy.

I'm sure, many have their stories about Jimmy to share, so how about it? Can we get more adventure stories to recall and share?
